All travelers through distant lands return with elements of those lands' richness inside — later integrated into the creation of new richness at home. As musical and spiritual travelers, Michael & Benjy have taken this journey to create the new land of Celtistan. The beautiful musical landscape there reverently merges Michael's Celtic and jazz sensibilities with Benjy's love of Indian classical music, giving the ancient traditions of India and Ireland a new melodic voice (with occasional touches of Asia and Bosnia). Celtistan's flowing and vibrant language was captured live, to preserve the unique richness, openness and spontaneity that shared moments bring.

Michael & Benjy have shared the depth and beauty of these moments since 1999, when it was clear from their first meeting that their synergy would take them and their audience to new acoustic lands.

Track 1 - "Iberian Nocturne" (Mandrell)

Inspired by traveling through medieval style villages in the Pyrenees mountains, this spirited piece is influenced by the melding of Spanish, French Celtic, and Arabesque modalities.

Track 2 - "Shining Child" (Mandrell)

A simple and playful guitar and tabla duet evocative of fond childhood memories.

Track 3 - "Sneakin' Out" (Wertheimer & Mandrell)

Created on the spot in the recording studio in between takes, a true example of the creative spirit working in the moment.

Track 4 – "Banish Misfortune" (traditional)

A traditional Irish fiddle tune - from the Celtic side of things, played Benjy and Michael style.

Track 5 - "Bhagavan Dude" (Mandrell)

Recorded live, this celebration of the tabla is a tribute to all the intrepid musician travelers who wander the world's musical byways in search of a little slice of life.

Track 6 - "Bhairavi" (Wertheimer)

Track 7 - "Waltz from the White Mountains" (Mandrell)

With an intro featuring the traditional Indian raga, Bhairavi, on the esraj, the second piece of this medley was inspired by Michael's visit to the Hemlock Forest of the White Mountains of New Hampshire.

Track 8 - "Montuno" (Mandrell)

A whimsical and danceable play on a classic familiar Latin theme.

Track 9 - "Turkish Coffee" (Wertheimer & Mandrell)

A hyper-caffeinated frame drum improvisation by Benjy with Michael hanging on the best he can.

Track 10 - "Road Dogs" (Wertheimer & Mandrell)

A rollicking version of a classic Michael & Benjy improvisational jam.

Track 11 - "Dreaming the Beloved" (Wertheimer)

Track 12 - "Touch of the Beloved" (Wertheimer & Mandrell)

Carrying on the legacy of their yoga/meditation album, "Anjali," this beautiful classical Indian raga finds new breath with Benjy leading on the esraj.

Track 13 - "What was the Question?" (Wertheimer)

This song is dedicated to Bosnian cellist Vedran Smailović, who played his cello on the square for 22 days to honor 22 people killed by Serbian forces while waiting in line for food and supplies ... even as snipers shot at passersby, mortar rounds fell, and machine gun battles raged nearby. In so doing, he made one of the most powerful possible protests, pointing out the craziness of the war surrounding him.

The song features a form of polytonal "throat singing" in which the vocalist produces two or more notes at the same time.
