During my years with Ancient Future, I found a wonderful avenue for developing world fusion music with some amazing musicians. Yet I still felt as if I was missing some connections with the threads of rock, funk, and Nigerian music that were such an important part of my early life.

Circle of Fire is the next step in my realization of this dream, seeking to integrate the electronic with the acoustic, the contemporary with the historic, and the North American with the global. I am a product of the United States, and it was in looking outward from my culture that I visualized Circle of Fire. Circle of Fire is intended first and foremost to be FUN - to inspire the dancer inside each of us and invite us deeper into our bodies. It is also a prayer that all of us in the United States will take the time to explore other cultures, other world-views, and other perspectives that place the truly important aspects of life ahead of the shallow materialism that is the tragic hallmark of contemporary Western life.
